The T.C. Caffey show is hitting the road and the Hubbard Eagles (4-0) are looking to remain perfect on the year when they travel to Struthers (2-2) for their first road game of the season.

The Eagles and Wildcats are meeting for the 88th time in a rivalry which began in 1916. Struthers leads the series 54-33, however Hubbard has won 16 of the last 20 meetings. Struthers last defeated Hubbard in 2017.

A week ago, Ursuline scored 48 points and it was just enough to defeat Austintown Fitch 48-47. On the same night, Warren G. Harding scored 46 points and it wasn't enough in a 49-46 loss to Massillon.

Now, the Irish and Raiders will match high-octane offenses when the two teams clash tonight at Mollenkopf Stadium.

Tonight's slate of games marks the halfway point of the 2021 regular season.

Harding (1-3) has lost to a trio of teams (Massillon, Hudson, Medina) who are a combined 11-1. In addition to scoring 46 points against Massillon, Harding's win was a 55-0 shutout over Youngstown East.

Ursuline (3-1) suffered its lone loss to Chardon (4-0). The Irish are averaging 46.8 points per game.

Tonight marks the eighth-straight year that Ursuline and Harding will meet on the gridiron. Since renewing the rivalry in 2014, the Raiders own a 4-3 advantage, including a current three game winning streak.

Poland (2-2) won the inaugural Northeast-8 Conference title in 2019. South Range (4-0) won the league championship a year ago. Now the two teams will meet in a game which could go a long way in determining this year's title winner.

South Range owns a 13-2 record in league play since the inception of the NE-8. Poland is 13-2 in the conference during the same time period. The Raiders have won 11 consecutive league games and 14

Browns set for Texans

CLEVELAND — Brash and even a little belligerent, Baker Mayfield waltzed into the NFL thinking he had things figured out. He quickly learned he had a lot to learn.

Tyrod Taylor taught him. When Cleveland fans fill FirstEnergy Stadium on Sunday for the first time in nearly two years, they'll see several familiar faces on Houston's roster, one of them Taylor, who was briefly the Browns' starter when Mayfield was a rookie in 2018.

Taylor only started three games, but Mayfield said the 32-year-old veteran had a major impact on his career.

"I think people took Tyrod for granted," said Mayfield. "He's an extremely good leader. His work ethic alone, just his routine and being the same guy every day for every single person in the building is a tremendous way of showing his leadership."

"Obviously great athlete and he's a great quarterback."

Taylor is coming off a strong debut in a win over Jacksonville for the Texans (1-0), who elevated him into the starting job this summer in the midst of Deshaun Watson's legal entanglements and his trade request.

Desperate to solve their quarterback issue three years ago, the Browns (0-1), who are coming off a Week 1 loss in Kansas City, traded a third-round pick to Buffalo for Taylor. The previous season he had helped the Bills end their long playoff drought.

Cleveland then chose Mayfield with the No. 1 overall pick, but he was not given a chance to beat out Taylor in training camp.

Things changed, though, in Week 3 when Mayfield replaced a concussed Taylor during a nationally televised Thursday night game against the New York Jets and rallied the Browns to their first win in 20 games.

Taylor's era in Cleveland may have been brief, but he helped shape Mayfield into the QB he is today.

"Everything that he taught me, leading by example and doing different things, not that we lead the same way, but there's always different ways to learn," Mayfield said. "I'm very thankful to have stepped in a QB room with Drew Stanton and Tyrod, that I was able to learn from those guys. It's something I'm obviously very grateful for."

Ursuline, Harding set for clash in Warren

WARREN — Having each faced some of the state's top teams so far this season, Ursuline and Warren G. Harding now will turn their attention to each other tonight at Mollenkopf Stadium.

The Irish (3-1) have compiled wins against Columbus Bishop Hartley (2-2), Hickory (PA, 1-2) and Austintown Fitch (2-1). Hartley and Fitch each would be in line to host a first-round playoff game if the postseason ended this week, according to computer rankings released by the OHSAA.

LaBrae's Aidan Stephens leading Vikings to hot start after committing to Yale in preseason

LEAVITTSBURG — Athletes with the last name Stephens have paced the halls of LaBrae High School for years before moving on to the collegiate ranks, most recently Tyler Stephens, who is now a tight end for the University of Buffalo.

The Stephens family in general is no stranger to playing collegiate athletics.

Now, another name will enter those ranks as Vikings senior quarterback Aidan Stephens announced his commitment before the season began. As someone who was taught

to prioritize education by his father, Aidan was able to choose between Yale and Harvard to continue his career.

The 6-foot-1 LaBrae quarterback, who plans on studying biology, chose New Haven over Cambridge, committing to Yale over the summer.

"The campus was really nice and obviously the education opportunities at Yale are great," Aidan said. "You can get the same thing at Harvard, but the coaching staff at Yale really clicked with me. I love those guys and everything that they had to provide for me."

Tony, Aidan's father, was a line-backer at Kent State and is currently

ninth all-time in career tackles at the program. After college, Tony went on to the NFL where he spent the 1989 season with the Cleveland Browns.

Having been a Division I athlete himself, Tony was involved in both his sons' recruiting processes. When Tyler was going to recruiting camps, Aidan was there too.

"I know how the recruiting process goes," Tony said. "You can't teach size. I knew Aidan had size and had athletic ability, so when I went to recruiting camps and things like that, Aidan came with us."

"One thing I've always told Tyler as an older brother is 'You have to set the pathway. You have to bring him along.' Tyler set the pathway and Aidan followed in his footsteps."

Reds avoid sweep, top Pittsburgh, 1-0

PITTSBURGH — Cincinnati Reds reliever Mychal Givens has been around long enough to understand the rhythms of a season.

Funks happen. What defines a team is how it responds to them. With the Reds staggering at the end of a frustrating nine-game road trip, Givens delivered a fastball that gave Cincinnati a much-needed jolt, exorcising some bad vibes in the process.

Givens struck out Pittsburgh's Hoy Park with a 98 mph heater to seal a 1-0 win over the Pirates on Thursday to send the Reds home for a pivotal series against the Los Angeles Dodgers with something akin to momentum.

Less than 24 hours after a stunning ninth-inning loss in which Givens surrendered the winning run when Wilmer Difo scored from second on a fielder's choice, he bounced back by picking up his eighth save.

It wasn't easy. The Pirates had the tying run on third and the winning run on second with

two outs. Givens fell behind Park 3-0 before four straight fastballs — all 95 mph or better — ended the threat.

"Compete," Givens said. "That's all that matters."

Something the Reds are trying to do in an effort to stay in the mix for the second NL wild-card spot. They entered the day 1 1/2 games behind St. Louis and were in danger of getting swept by the last-place Pirates.

Instead, Tyler Mahle battled through six innings, Asdrubal Cabrera hit a go-ahead, pinch-hit sacrifice fly in the seventh and the bullpen did the rest.

"It's really important," Givens said. "We needed this win today especially to continue to contend for a playoff spot."

Mahle (12-5) allowed five hits — all singles — and struck out four with a walk as the Reds finished 3-6 during a nine-game swing through Chicago, St. Louis and Pittsburgh.

Cabrera, 0 for 18 since Cincinnati claimed him off waivers last month, provided the game's only run while pinch-hitting for Mahle in the top of the

seventh. Tyler Stephenson led off with a double against Cody Ponce (0-4) and pinch-runner Delino DeShields moved to third on Shogo Akiyama's sacrifice bunt two batters later. Cabrera followed with a long drive toward the gap in left-center that let DeShields trot home.

"That's why I'm here," the 35-year-old Cabrera said. "I'm here to help the team to win."

Either Los Angeles or San Francisco — whoever doesn't win the NL West — will claim the first wild-card berth. Cincinnati is hoping to emerge from a four-team scramble with St. Louis, San Diego and Philadelphia for the other.

A pair of tight losses — including the stunning walk-off on Difo's mad dash from second — had the Reds teetering. Givens, acquired in a July trade in an effort to stabilize the bullpen, was eager for another crack at the Pirates.

"That kind of stuff happens," Givens said. "For me (the loss) was a fluke for me. At the same time, you just wake up the next day and compete."

Ben Gamel had two of Pittsburgh's six hits, but he was also thrown out at the plate in the second inning while trying to score from third on a fielder's choice by Michael Perez. Cincinnati second baseman Jonathan India's throw home was perfect and Stephenson had the ball by the time Gamel attempted to unsuccessfully slide under the tag.

Pittsburgh fell to 0-14 this season when trying to sweep an opponent. There were bright spots, however, for a club that went 6-3 during a nine-game homestand against Detroit, Washington and Cincinnati.

"We haven't had a sweep all season but, as of late, we're playing really good baseball," Pirates third baseman Ke'Bryan Hayes said. "Pitching's there. Hitting's there. So, that's all we can ask for."

ROOKIE PERSEVERES
Rookie right-hander Connor Overton, claimed off waivers from Toronto earlier this month, worked three scoreless innings in his first career start.

"I had that quick moment of

being overwhelmed, and then I kind of came to and just wanted to do the same thing I've been doing all year, just making pitches and getting people out," Overton said.

The 28-year-old, pitching for his fifth major league organization since being taken by Miami in the 2014 draft, has worked 10 2/3 innings in the majors without surrendering a run. The right-hander, who underwent Tommy John surgery and spent time in independent ball in an effort to keep his career alive, is making a case to be in the mix for a spot somewhere on the pitching staff in 2022.

"I can't really control that," he said. "All I can control is focus on what I can control, and that's coming out here and trying to be the same guy every day and making quality pitches and keeping hitters off balance. That's really it."

lost three games to teams that are (a combined) 11-1, and they went deep into the fourth quarter with them. We have to play a great game because they have weapons all over the place." Raider head coach Steve Arnold says his team just has to keep plugging away in order to turn the corner. The losses to Hudson and Massillon were each by just one score, and Harding hung around for a while with Medina.

"We just have to get ready to play and have a great week of practice," Arnold said. "We can't hang our heads. We just have to build on the positives from Massillon and be ready to play against a talented Ursuline team."

In the Irish, Harding will face off against a high-octane offense that's averaged nearly 47 points per game, and has broken 45 in each of its wins.

Ursuline can deploy multiple weapons, as quarterback Brady Shannon

has thrown for 771 yards and 10 touchdowns on a 58-for-92 start to the year. Meanwhile, running back DeMarcus McElroy has carried the ball 88 times for 746 yards and 11 touchdowns — averages of 186.5 yards per game and 8.5 yards per carry.

Dean Boyd and Marc Manning are Shannon's favorite targets. Boyd, a Harvard commit, has 15 receptions for 248 yards and a touchdown on the year while Manning has a team-high 16 receptions for 190 yards and four scores.

"You have to take away the best things they do, because you can't prepare for everything," Arnold said. "So you try to take away the things they like to do, neutralize that and then keep the football out of their hands, as well."

Reardon says the Irish will continue to seek that balanced attack.

"When we're at our best, we're able to have a good mix, and along with that just take what the defense gives us and not force things," he said. "The other thing we

always talk about, and it sounds like coach speak but it's true, is we have to take care of the football and create takeaways. For the most part this year we've done a good job of that, and as a result the offense has been pretty dynamic at times."

On the flip side, Harding's offense has had a season of extremes. The Raiders put up 46 points against Massillon and hung 55 on East, but were held to 14 and 10 by Medina and Hudson, respectively.

In last week's 49-46 loss to Massillon, quarterback Dalys Jett exploded for 360 yards and five touchdowns on a 21-for-34 night.

That said, Arnold says to still expect Harding to try and establish its run game, too.

"The intent is always to run the ball successfully. Sometimes it doesn't work that way, and you have to take what the defense gives you and take advantage of what's working well," he said.

"Last week, our linemen gave our quarterback time, he made good decisions and

our receivers got open and made plays."

And though Arnold wouldn't comment specifically on what Harding plans to attack tonight, he did mention that ball security is of the utmost importance.

"Number 1, we have to take care of the ball. ... And again, what's working and what's successful during the game, we'll try to continue to do and make (Ursuline) make adjustments."

Harding's skill players stand out to Reardon.

"They have guys that can make plays, and they've shown that. They don't lack for skill," he said.

"We both have good skill, and we have to do a great job of defending against big pass plays. Their receivers have the ability to get behind defenses if you aren't careful, and then make plays in the open field. So we'll need to do a good job of pressuring the quarterback and being sound in pass coverage so we don't give them anything cheap."

Kickoff is slated for 7 p.m.

Taylor said he hasn't closely followed Mayfield's career, but he was impressed by the young QB's quick rise in their one season together.

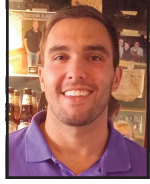

It will be the Colts' first appearance on "Hard Knocks," which debuted in 2001 by following the Baltimore Ravens through training camp as they began defense of their Super Bowl title. The Dallas Cowboys recently wrapped up the 16th edition of the documentary series, becoming the first to make three appearances.

The Colts series will have at least nine episodes on Wednesday nights at 10 p.m. ET.

"We could not be more thrilled to bring Hard Knocks and the remarkable behind-the-scenes access it provides to the NFL regular season," NFL Films senior executive Ross Ketover said in a statement. "For years, fans have clamored for expanding the Hard Knocks world to include an in-season edition, and thanks to HBO, along with the incredible cooperation from the Colts, we are able to deliver."

NFL Films did four years of the "All or Nothing" series for Amazon Prime Video, where it followed a team for the entire season, but those episodes were not available until the following summer.

The Colts are trying to make a return trip to the playoffs but dropped their opener to the Seattle Seahawks. Indianapolis traded for quarterback Carson Wentz during the offseason, and linebacker Darius Leonard was the NFL Defensive Rookie of the Year in 2018.

The series also could showcase coach Frank Reich, who is in his fourth season.

NBA: Mavericks sign former first-rounder

DALLAS — The Dallas Mavericks signed free agent Frank Ntilikina on Thursday, adding the guard picked one spot before their selection of Dennis Smith Jr. in the top 10 of the 2017 draft.

Ntilikina spent four years with the New York Knicks, who drafted him eighth overall four years ago. Smith went ninth to the Mavericks, who traded the point guard to the Knicks a year and a half later in the blockbuster deal that brought Kristaps Porzingis to Dallas.

The 23-year-old Ntilikina averaged 5.5 points and 2.7 assists with the Knicks. Born in Belgium, he moved to France when he was 3 and began his professional career in 2015 in a French pro league.

Ntilikina played in the Tokyo Olympics for France, which lost to the U.S. in the gold medal game.

The Mavericks had focused on guards in free agency, adding veterans Sterling Brown and Reggie Bullock as they continue to build around star point guard Luka Doncic. Dallas also re-signed shooting guard Tim Hardaway Jr.

RACING: Jockey banned for 10 years

OCEANPORT, N.J. — Jockey Tomas Mejia has been banned 10 years for using an electronic device to win a race at Monmouth Park earlier this month.

In a ruling announced Thursday, the stewards at Monmouth Park also fined the 26-year-old Panamanian \$5,000 and recommended that the New Jersey Racing Commission permanently revoke his jockey's license. Tracks around the country will uphold the ban.

The stewards said in their ruling that Mejia used the electronic device in winning the seventh race at Monmouth on Sept. 3 with Strongerthanuknow. They said he had the prohibited device entering the winner's circle and prior to dismounting.

The board said photographic evidence was presented at its hearing on Sept. 9. The jockey was taken off his mounts the following day. The original hearing was continued on Wednesday before a decision was made. It came on Mejia's birthday.

During the suspension, which runs through Sept. 9, 2031, Mejia is denied access to all grounds under the jurisdiction of the state racing commission.

Mejia had 19 wins in 149 rides at Monmouth Park this season and was 11th among the jockeys in wins. For the year, he had 42 wins on 350 mounts.

Mejia started riding in the United States in 2018 and has 110 wins in 1,101 rides with earnings of \$2.96 million.

LPGA: 3-way tie in Portland Classic

WEST LINN, Ore. — Carlota Ciganda overcame an early double bogey in chilly morning conditions Thursday for a 4-under 68 and a share of the first-round lead in the Cambia Portland Classic.

The only member of the winning European Solheim Cup team in the field, the Spaniard teed off with the temperature in the low 50s at hilly, windy and tricky Oregon Golf Club.

Gemma Dryburgh of Scotland also shot a 68 in the morning, and Pajaree Anannarukam of Thailand grabbed a share of the lead in the afternoon. Anannarukam won last month in Northern Ireland for her first LPGA Tour title.

Second-ranked Jin Young Ko was a stroke back along with Perrine Delacour, 2009 winner Mi Jung Hur, Su Oh, Jenny Shin and Paula Reto.

Ciganda birdied two of her first four holes, then gave the strokes back with the double bogey on the par-4 14th. The two-time LPGA Tour winner rebounded to birdie two of the next three, dropped a stroke on the par-4 second and added three more birdies.

Stacy Lewis, the 2017 champion, had a 73.

Martin Truex Jr. wins playoff race at Richmond Raceway

Martin Truex Jr. received a penalty on the opening lap of the race for crossing the start/finish line in front of polesitter Denny Hamlin at the green flag. But 400 laps later Truex led the field across the line again — this time as the race winner of Saturday night's Federated Auto Parts 400 Salute to First Responders at Richmond (Va.) Raceway.

The convincing 1.317-second margin of victory over his Joe Gibbs Racing teammates Hamlin and Christopher Bell marked Truex's third win in the last five races at Richmond, his fourth win of the 2021 season and, most importantly, gave him that coveted automatic bid into the next round of the NASCAR Cup Series Playoffs.

Truex joins Hamlin, who won last week's Playoff opener at Darlington, S.C. and Regular Season Champion Kyle Larson, who finished sixth on Saturday, as the only three drivers to have officially secured positions in the Playoffs' Round of 12 that begins in two weeks at Las Vegas.

The first thing Truex did after climbing out of his winning No. 19 Joe Gibbs Racing Toyota was acknowledge the importance of the September 11 date to our country and thank the fans for showing their support on the solemn anniversary and for their patriotic support of the sport of NASCAR.

As for his early setback, "That was frustrating, I'm not going to lie," Truex said of the race start. "But I knew we had a good enough car to overcome it. Just one of those things you have to put out of your mind and go race. A lot on the line tonight.

"But going to Bristol (Tenn.) next week without any worries is always fun," he added with a smile.

Truex, who led a total of 80 laps, took the lead for good — pacing the field for the final 51 laps — following a series of green flag pit stops in the final portion of the race. Just prior to the pit sequence, another JGR teammate, Kyle Busch, had positioned himself to be a factor at the checkered flag. Instead, Busch received his second pit road penalty of the night — a speeding violation during his green flag stop with 55 laps remaining. At the time, it dropped him to 10th place, the last car

on the lead lap after he had been out front for 39 laps just prior to the green flag stops. He ultimately finished ninth.

Last week's winner Hamlin had been the strong car early, leading 100 of the opening 152 laps and a race best 197 on the night, winning both Stages. But the pit road sequence, lapped traffic and an awakened Truex forced Hamlin to play catch-up in the end.

"The whole JGR team had fast cars for all of us today. I really wish we had gotten two in a row, but regardless still a great day for the team," Hamlin said.

Unlike last week's Playoff opener at Darlington, when several of the 16 Playoff cars suffered setbacks and disappointing finishes, Saturday night those cars reminded why they are in position to challenge for a championship. Thirteen of the top 15 cars were driven by Playoff drivers.

Reigning NASCAR Cup Series champion Chase Elliott finished fourth in a Hendrick Chevrolet and Team Penske's Joey Logano was fifth in a Ford. Larson finished sixth, followed by the only non-Playoff driver among the top 10, Ross Chastain.

Stewart-Haas Racing's driver Kevin Harvick, Kyle Busch and Team Penske's Ryan Blaney rounded out the top 10.

Playoff drivers Alex Bowman, Brad Keselowski, Aric Almirola and Tyler Reddick finished 12th-15th. William Byron (19th), Michael McDowell (28th) and Kurt Busch (37th) rounded out the Playoff finishers.

Busch, who led laps early, suffered a tire problem that sent his No. 1 Chip Ganassi Racing Chevrolet hard into the Turn 1 wall only 40 laps into the race.

"Something happened with that left rear, it let go," said Busch, who was running in the top-five at the time of his accident. "It let go of our points and it let go of our whole season right now. I don't know what we're going to have to do at Bristol other than win."

Despite the tough luck, Busch heads into Saturday night's Playoff Round of 16 finale at Bristol (Tenn.) Motor Speedway in a mathematical tie with Bowman for the 12th Playoff position — and last transfer position.

Brandon Brown, Harrison Burton and Jeb Burton rounded out the top 10.

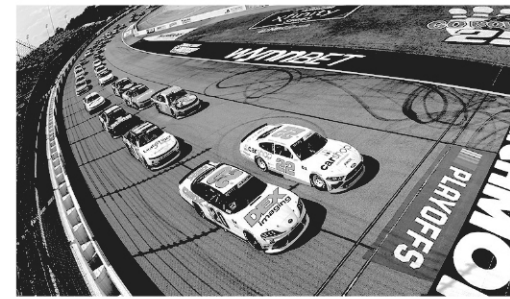

He knows what it takes to get here. He saw all of Tyler's accolades, he saw the hard work Tyler did, so he just followed the footsteps."

The family ties don't stop there. Aidan's cousin, Mason Tipton, is already at Yale and is one of the team's wide receivers. Aidan credits Tipton for getting Yale onto him.

"They actually reached out to me on Twitter," Aidan said. "I think my cousin put in a word for me there."

He plans on working with Tipton in the offseason to get reacquainted to the wide receiver position, as he's expecting to transition to wide receiver in college.

Now that he's committed to a school, Aidan has a sense of relief. With so many family members before him suiting up in the collegiate ranks, he felt some pressure to continue that tradition.

Now that the recruiting process is over, Aidan feels like he can get back to football.

"My brother plays tight end, my dad played at Kent, my uncle played at Toledo and another uncle of mine is a professional boxer," he said.

"We have a lot of athletes in the

family so I'm super blessed. It's a lot of relief now. There was a lot of pressure, especially once Tyler got his offer, I felt a lot of pressure to keep that standard. So, I just feel a lot of relief now that I got it."

That relief has let Aidan get back into his comfort zone as he has accounted for 247 yards on the ground and 419 yards through the air through four weeks.

The senior has nine rushing touchdowns and a passing touchdown.

Aidan and the Vikings (3-1) face off against rival Champion tonight at Champion's Community Stadium. Kickoff is set for 7 p.m.

Browns punter Gillan 'devastated' by fumble in KC

BEREA — Browns punter Jamie Gillan spent the summer catching footballs fired at him from a machine during practice. He snagged thousands.

Last Sunday, he couldn't handle one that counted.

Gillan failed to catch a snap in the fourth quarter of the opener at Kansas City, and then made matters worse when he tried to run for a first down and was tackled, sending the Browns to a 33-29 loss to the Chiefs.

Browns special teams coordinator Mike Priefer was at a loss to explain what happened.

"He just dropped it," Priefer said Thursday.

Gillan's gaffe — one of three crucial mistakes by Cleveland in the second half — gave the Chiefs possession at the 15-yard line and they quickly scored a touchdown to expand their lead with 7:04 remaining.

The Browns never recovered.

Gillan, nicknamed "The Scottish Hammer" because of the way he can punish a football with his left foot, hasn't spoken to reporters since his fateful flub. Priefer said the 24-year-old, who is in his third season with Cleveland, was distraught following the

game. "Devastated," Priefer said. "We all were. We all were for him and for our football team."

It may not have helped Gillan that the Browns offense had played so well that he wasn't attempting his first punt of the season until the fourth quarter. With the Chiefs rallying, Arrowhead Stadium was quaking with noise.

However, Priefer offered no excuses and said Gillan isn't running from

accountability. "We talked about it a little bit on the airplane and he had really no excuse, no excuse why he dropped it," Priefer said as the Browns prepared for this week's home opener against the Houston Texans. "He's not an excuse-maker, he's a standup guy and he knows he's got to perform at a high level and keep being a weapon for our football team, and it starts this Sunday." Even after Gillan

scooped up his fumble, Priefer said he still had time to punt it. Gillan, though, tucked it under his arm the way he used to while playing rugby and took off running to his right before being brought down.

That was his second error.

"If anything, go left," Priefer said. "We work on similar things, like if the ball goes over his head, he circles back this way so he can scoop it up and then

punt with his left foot. We talk about different situations — bad snaps or dropped snaps."

The Browns may discuss those things, but they don't work on them.

"I don't like to practice failure," Priefer said. "I'm being serious, like a fire call on a field goal. We muffed a field goal snap, we talk about it, but we never want to actually practice that exact situation because to me if you're

practicing a dropped snap, you're practicing failure.

"Do we talk about those things? Of course, and we cover the different situations."

Despite Gillan's costly play, Priefer hasn't lost any confidence in him.

"Not at all," he said. "He's got great hands. He's a great athlete. He wasn't a holder until he got here and he became a really good holder. I can't explain why he dropped it."

NOTES: Starting RB Jack Conklin (knee) was back at practice after missing Wednesday. However, starting LT Jedrick Wills Jr. (ankle) remains sidelined along with his backup, Chris Hubbard (triceps). If they can't play, rookie James Hudson III will make his first NFL start. ... C JC Tretter (knee) was also held out but probably more as a precaution. ... LB Anthony Walker Jr. (hamstring) was limited. ... S John Johnson III struggled with dehydration against the Chiefs and had a curious theory why. "Honestly, I think it is like the socks that we have to wear," he said. "The NFL mandates you have to have your legs covered up, and I think that kind of plays a part in it. I do not know. I might be wrong."
