Carey stuns Coldwater for its first state title since 1975

CANTON - There's a good chance Coldwater players, coaches and fans will never hear a train horn the same way again.

They will most likely think back to the Carey

train horn that kept blowing Saturday in the Division VI state championship at Tom Benson Hall of Fame Stadium, or remember the freight train that was the Carey football team that steamrolled through the Cavaliers 26-14 for its second state championship in school history.

For the Cavalier players, it will certainly have nightmares of 6-foot-1, 265pound running back Jordan Vallejo coming at them 25 times and scoring twice and Coldwater committing two costly turnovers in the first half.

On the other hand, Carey players or coaches might've thought winning a state championship was a dream. But Saturday it turned into a reality.

"It's indescribable, but all the hard work we put in as a class and with the underclassmen that helped us out to get where we are today," Carey's Derek Lonsway said. "I'm glad we went out with a bang. I'm so proud of our team, the town, the coaching staff, no words to

CANTON — For much of Saturday's Division VI state final in Canton, Carey coach Jonathan Mershman appeared to be assuming the role of a riverboat gambler.

Five times, Mershman had his offense go for it on fourth down against Coldwater. Twice, he had his team attempt the two-point conversion after a touchdown.

And with 3:41 left in the first half and his squad - consensus underdogs – leading 15-7, Mershman rolled the dice with an onside kick.

The results of these risks were mixed. The Blue Devils only converted two of their fourth down attempts, though they were 2 for 2 on 2-point conversions.

And the onside kick? It bounced out of bounds,

SYLVANIA - Toledo St. Francis won the state hockey championship last spring and the Knights seem locked, loaded and prepared to make another run at the title after blanking Findlay 7-0 on Saturday in a matchup of state-ranked teams at Tam-O-Shanter Arena in Sylvania. FHS goalie Cody Mlsna made 31 saves. But a St. Francis team that features 14 seniors returning from a club that beat perennial power Lakewood St. Edward in last year title game had plenty of firepower in backing up its No. 1 ranking in the state polls. St. Francis upped its record to 6-1-0 overall and 3-0-0 in the Red Division of the Northwest Hockey Conference. Findlay, which was ranked No. 8 in the state entering the match, leveled off at 3-3-2 overall, 1-1-0 in the league.
