Sidney's Davis earns 2nd **OHSWCA** girls title

HILLIARD — Sidney sophomore Josie Davis picked up her second consecutive Ohio High School Wrestling Coaches Association girls title on Saturday at Hilliard-Davidson High School.

Davis, who won the 126-pound title last year, finished first in the 121-pound weight class on Saturday. She won her first match by pinning Jamestown Greeneview's Alison Calhoun in 20 seconds and won a quarterfinal match by pinning Minerva's Kayla Phillips in 25 seconds. She pinned Delaware Hayes' Meredith Miligan in 27 seconds in a semifinal before winning the championship match against Hamilton Badin's Rachel Nusky by a 9-2 decision.

It was the second such event for girls wrestling, which is not sanctioned by the Ohio High School Athletic Association. The private tournament had about 225 wrestlers from 106 schools.

Sidney has 2 individuals, relays qualify for state

Sidney had several swimmers qualify for the Division I state meet next Saturday in Canton by finishing high enough in last weekend's district meet at Miami University.

Sidney's Jarrett Payne qualified in the 200 individual medley and 100 freestyle and Jaden Humphrey qualified in the 100 backstroke. Payne finished third in the 200 IM in the district meet and Humphrey finished ninth.

Humphrey and Payne are also a part of two relays that qualified. The pair, along with Badin Brewer and Jahvon Lloyd, finished fifth in the 200 freestyle relay and sixth in the 400 freestyle.

Sidney falls in overtime to Beavercreek

VANDALIA — Sidney dealt well

with Beavercreek's extreme height advantage for three quarters in a Division I sectional opener on Saturday at Vandalia-Butler's Student Activities Center.

Unfortunately for the Yellow Jackets, they couldn't deal with it for five quarters.

Sidney led by as many as 15 points in the first half and 10 in the second half but couldn't hold on and lost 74-70 in overtime. It's the first time the squad has lost in a first-round tournament game since


"Our defense just wasn't as strong in the first half as it was the second half," Sidney coach John Willoughby said. "The more tired you get, the harder it is. Just like a good pressing team, (dealing with a height disadvantage) may not get you the first three quarters, but it can get you in the last minutes. It wears you down.

"For the most part, we did about as well as we could against it. I thought we did an excellent job against it. I'm really proud of how they battled inside. But we just let them penetrate too much in the fourth quarter and didn't keep them in front of us."

The Yellow Jackets finish 10-9 overall. Seven of their nine losses were by single-digit margins, with four coming by four points or less.

Sidney will lose eight seniors to graduation, including Martin, who was a first team all-Miami Valley League selection. Martin, a 5-foot-9 forward, averaged 13.3 points, 12.2 rebounds, five assists, 2.6 steals and two blocks per game.

Sidney will also lose guards Camden Vordemark, Cedric Johnson, Ryan Schloss, Josh Webster and Deegan Meyer to graduation along with forwards Darrius Basil and Isaiah Huggins. Vordemark averaged 12.1 points and 4.4 rebounds per game and was an honorable mention all-MVL selection.

Martin, who was recently named first team all-Miami Valley League, scored 15 points and had nine rebounds, three steals and two assists.

"I really like the group," Willoughby said. "I really spent a lot of time in the summer with them, especially three or four of them. That's what I'll miss the most with those guys, the time you get spend with them in the offseason. I'll miss those guys.'

Sidney will return two starters in junior guard Devin Taborn and junior forward Jaden Swiger. Taborn averaged 12.6 points per game and was a second team all-MVL selection. Swiger averaged 10.7 points and 3.1 rebounds per

"Both those guys back, and we've got players coming along on the JV team," Willoughby said. "Just because we're graduating eight, there's no drop off at all."

Adam Duvall, a 6-foot-7 guard, made 3-of-4 free-throw attempts in the final 26 seconds for the Beavers to seal the win. It was part of a huge free-throw disparity; the Yellow Jackets surpassed 10 fouls in regulation before overtime while

HIGH SCHOOL BOWLING

Sidney squads getting ready for district tourney

SIDNEY — The names are different this season for the Sidney High School boys bowling team. The goal remains the same.

Sidney, which returned two varsity bowlers from last season's OHSAA Division I state championship team, attempts for a return trip to Columbus at the district championships on Wednesday. The top five teams and top five bowlers not on qualifying teams advance to the D-I state tournament March 6 at Wayne Webb's

Columbus Bowl. Sidney junior Sarah Bell advanced to the D-I girls district meet on Thursday. She'll shoot for one of five qualifying spots for individuals not on a qualifying team. The girls state tournament is March 5, also at Columbus Bowl.

"Like I told the kids going into sectionals, it's just bowling," Knoop said. "Just because it's at a different level now, you're just bowling. You're doing what you've been doing your entire high school career. That's how you have to look at it. Don't look at the pressure situations. Just bowl.'

The Sidney boys shot 3,984 to finish sixth at the district meet last week at Poelking Woodman Lanes in Kettering. Troy won the sectional title with 4,230.

Junior Jarred Kirk led the Yellow Jackets with a three-game total 590. He was followed by junior Kaden Abbott (587), senior Sam Bailey (564) and freshman Jayce Kirk

(517). Freshman Keaton Fisher bowled a two-game to help out their team-348 and senior Blaine McClain a one-game 143.

Sidney was in 15th place after the regular games, five spots out of a district qualifying spot. They rallied during the Baker games. The Yellow Jackets bowled Baker games of 241, 203, 180, 203. 193 and 215 for an average of 205.8.

"We had an absolute dominating Baker," Knoop said. "It skyrocketed us to No. 6."

The boys district tournament also includes Troy, Fairborn and Xenia from the Miami Valley League. Troy won the MVL overall title and Miami Division title, while Sidney won the Valley Division. The Greater Western Ohio Conference also makes a strong appearance with Beavercreek, Centerville, Fairmont and Wayne.

Cincinnati Elder won the D-I sectional title for the southern schools and was followed in the top three by LaSalle and Wilmington. For comparison, Sidney would have finished fourth in that sectional, and three pins away from third.

"Our district, I believe it's far and away the toughest district around. It's always, always a slug fest to get (to state)," Knoop said. "We have to have a good day. We need see what happens." Sidney will count on

its veteran leadership from Kirk and Abbott, who both competed on Sidney's state title team in 2020. Abbott finished fifth in the MVL with a 208.6 average and Kirk was eighth at 197.7.

I think they are going mates with their experience and what they've gone through. They know what the pressure is like. They know what the situation is like. They're both good leaders," Knoop said.

"They've both been here before and they know what they're doing. They know how to handle themselves. It all comes down to spare shooting and I think both of them are doing that at a high level right now."

Bell finished 19th overall at the sectional tournament with a 533 series.

Also competing at sectional for the Yellow Jackets – who had five bowlers on the team this season – were senior Kate Miller (408), junior Emma Hurley (449), sophomore Desiree Beck (299) and freshman Liann Morris (436). Sidney finished 16th as a team with 2.125. Xenia won the sectional title with 3,819.

"I think Sarah has as good of a shot as anybody to qualify," Knoop said. "She had a really good day. Her spare shooting is at a really good level right now, which is huge. I think if she has a day like she did at sectional she definitely has a shot.

"We have at least one girl coming up next year who will make an immediate impact. The future is bright (for the girls team)."

75 Years February 24, 1946


A group of 14 Shelby county

Beavercreek was called for five the entire second half.

Willoughby and Sidney's fans made their displeasure of the foul disparity known — but it didn't stop the squad from building a 10-point lead in the third quarter.

That fell apart down the stretch. The Beavers have four players 6-4 or taller, including 6-7 forward Braden Grant and 6-8 center Gabe Phillips. Those players started passing over Sidney and finding shots in the post in the fourth.

Siloam Baldwin, a 6-4 guard, made a driving layup with little defensive pressure from Sidney in the final 10 seconds in the fourth to tie it 67-67. Martin missed a 3-pointer from the right wing as time expired.

The teams traded the first two baskets in overtime. Swiger split a pair of free throws in the final minute that allowed the Beavers to keep a 71-70 lead, and Duvall sealed it at the line from there.

"The players did everything we asked," Willoughby said. "I thought our rebounding was excellent and I thought our sharing of the ball was excellent until the last few possessions. We didn't run our stuff late and had too much one-on-one there at the end.

"That's been our problem all year. We don't execute as well as we should and think we can take it on our own. But overall, I thought we played about as hard as we have all year." Swiger, who is a 6-2 center, led Sid-

ney with 23 points. He shot 10 for 12 from the floor in the game. "Jaden has good hands and that wide
